I am delighted to introduce you to this booklet, a celebration of our journey as Community Inspirers.

In September 2016, we met as strangers from different areas of the borough, introduced to each other by the West Cheshire Poverty Truth Coordinator. At first we were all a bit apprehensive but, by the end of the first session, we'd already connected well as a group – we were the Community Inspirers and our journey had begun. We were asked to think about our own stories; of life, and how we came to be in poverty.

As we continued to get together as a group, we were asked to share our stories – provided we were ready. It was a compelling, powerful and emotive experience for all. Not just reading them out, but hearing each other speak as well. In addition to our stories, a few of the Community Inspirers, myself included, wrote a song for this event. We also had the opportunity to record it at a recording studio. The process was a fantastic experience, a great learning curve and we gained a lot more confidence as a result. Before the launch we met regularly for six months, sharing stories, getting to know each other better, growing in confidence, and becoming more passionate about our cause, developing friendships and really developing as Community Inspirers. All of the ideas for the Poverty Truth Commission launch came from us; from the music, the performances, and the food served at lunch to becoming known as the Community Inspirers. In the same way this booklet has been developed by us - we hope you find it inspiring.



What is the West Cheshire Poverty Truth Commission?

The Poverty Truth Commission brings together some of Cheshire West and Chester's key decision makers with those living at the sharp end of poverty.

We work together towards overcoming poverty in Cheshire West and Chester ensuring that those affected by decisions are central to decision-making. The Commission believes poverty will only be truly addressed when those who experience it first-hand are at the heart of the process. Poverty Truth Commissions began in Scotland and have since been created in Leeds, Wolverhampton and Salford. West Cheshire is only the fourth to launch in the UK. All Poverty Truth Commissions, despite local variations in approach and practice, carry with them the theme taken from the South African postapartheid process, "Nothing about – without us – is for us". Poverty Truth Commissions develop from the belief that real progress towards overcoming poverty will be made when those who hold experience of poverty are central to the development, delivery and analysis of solutions.






Who are the Community Inspirers?


The following images throughout this booklet tell each Community Inspirer's story. They are real life stories that are emotive, challenging and inspirational.

Sinking deep,



The launch of the West Cheshire Poverty Truth Commission

The aim of the launch event was to raise awareness of the West Cheshire Poverty Truth Commission across the community and with key stakeholders. The event highlighted real life poverty stories that our residents are regularly faced with, aiming to find solutions and make changes within the borough.

The event included the sharing of Community Inspirers' stories through dance, poetry and a play by young people from the borough. It was held at Chester Racecourse who gifted the venue free of charge. The event generated over 240 tweets and trended on Twitter in Cheshire.

The very high profile event was attended by more than 200 civic, business and faith leaders, including the Leader and Deputy Leader of the Council, the Chief and Deputy Chief Executive of the Council, the MP for Ellesmere Port and Neston and representatives from Joseph Rowntree Foundation (an independent organisation looking at the underlying causes of poverty and finding solutions).

lunch...


"The idea behind your lunch today is quite symbolic. Most of you are aware of the foodbank and the amazing service they provide to help those in poverty. But the truth is they shouldn't need to exist. Nobody should be going hungry."

"Your lunch today will be a basic meal made only from ingredients you may find in a foodbank parcel. You will notice there are no extras such as fresh vegetables or bread."

Community Inspirers as Commissioners

"Hopes for the future; to make things easier and better for the disabled. Make it easier for people in need, making it fair and easier for people to get what they are entitled to and get the right help that they need."


"Help to get a job, training, education, a chance of a better life."


"Each individual gains strength, others to gain help from our actions and achieve goals."


"Inspiring change. Listening to people - making change - getting others involved. Take the message to other groups and connect with other organisations."

"Why are the disabled unemployed, moved from Work Choice onto the Work Programme after six months? If they have failed to find a job in six months, with support, it doesn't make sense to give them even less support and start sanctions for none compliance. They are no less disabled!"

"I feel like I always did the right thing, as a

"I feel like I always did the right thing, as a citizen, I studied hard, worked hard, bought property, paid taxes, followed the rules. However when I needed help after a breakdown I felt forgotten."

"It feels like the job centre is not there to help you, the staff are there to meet their targets and get you off their books. If clients were treated with humanity and respect they would find their journey a lot less difficult."





My husband, Bill was the first and last man I loved. When he was 47 he suffered a heart attack and was deemed not fit to work.

The then DSS went against the medical decision and Bill's claim was revoked after he was sent before a panel. Bill went through this demoralising and intimidating process a further three times and after three years of stress and worry he suffered a heart attack and died. I got a letter from the DSS on the day of his funeral saying he had been accepted for sickness benefit.

Bill and many other people have died due to the benefits system and what makes me sad is that twenty years after he died there is still no improvement in the way the system works or the attitude of those enforcing it.

We live in a society that puts cost cutting above people's lives and welfare.
